The Staunton-Parkersburg Turnpike was a toll road built by the Commonwealth of Virginia in the mid-19th century to connect Staunton (VA) with Parkersburg (present-day WV). Running through Highland and Augusta Counties in Virginia, and Pocahontas, Randolph, Upshur, Lewis, Gilmer, Ritchie, Wirt, and Wood Counties in West Virginia, control of this road became crucial during the Civil War.

The turnpike in West Virginia was designated a National Scenic Byway in 2005. Today, visitors can follow much of the original route, via US 250 from Staunton to Elkins, US 33 to Troy, and WV 47 to Parkersburg.



Hear the train whistle! Smell the coal smoke! Visit the train station!

Train lovers traveling the Staunton-Parkersburg Turnpike will want to make plans to spend a few extra days in Randolph and Pocahontas Counties. Two companies offer six unique train rides in the mountains of West Virginia.

From Elkins:

The New Tygart Flyer for a 4-hour ride along the Shavers Fork to the High Falls.

The Cheat Mountain Salamander offers a 6-hour ride to Cheat Bridge or a 9-hour ride to the former logging town of Spruce.

The Mountain Explorer Dinner Train is an evening trip to the High Falls, complete with a four-course meal.

Cass Scenic Railroad State Park offers scenic train rides that transport you back in time. Relatively unchanged and filled with rich history, Cass Scenic Railroad gives riders a glimpse into the wilderness and close-up of the sights and sounds of original steam-driven locomotives.

Two trips are offered: a 1 ½-hour trip to a replica logging camp at Whitaker Station, and a 4 ½-hour trip to Bald Knob. The third highest point in the state, Bald Knob provides a spectacular view at an elevation of 4,700 feet from its overlook.

Cass offers a few unique lodging options. For the adventurous types, rent a caboose or the wilderness cabin on top of the mountain. Or for those who prefer modern amenities, stay in a restored company house in town.

The Durbin & Greenbrier Valley Railroad offers train rides from two historic train depots: Durbin and Elkins.

From Durbin:

The Durbin Rocket is a 2-hour ride on a rare steam train. Old #3 is one of only three operating Climax logging locomotives in the world.

Stay overnight along the Greenbrier River in the Castaway Caboose, a refurbished Wabash caboose. It's a perfect balance of seclusion and modern amenities.
